



Number of the day has given students opportunities to work with numbers that they understand while building upon their addition, subtraction, place value and literacy properties which was enjoyed by all students.

Green Class

This term green class have explored many aspects of Australia. They have studied the bush, ocean, desert, rainforests and urban areas. They have done so through books, visual media, maps, videos and class discussions. These units have allowed us to become more familiar with the places where we live and become more knowledaeable about sustainability and pollution and how this effects these environments.

Green class this term have worked on specific topics position, area and perimeter, time and multiplication and division. Some of these topics were easier than others for our students but they all enjoyed participating in game based activities to learn about each topic, alongside guided maths, Matific, and number of the day. Green class have also dedicated themselves to setting per-





sonal mathematic goals in which they work towards improving an area of maths in which they believe they need development. This has allowed all students to take control of their learning and recognise and reflect on their strengths and weaknesses.

Green class have also been participating in K-Street lessons on specific emotions each week. We have been able to identify what it looks and feels like when experiencing different emotions like angry, sad, happy and frustrated. Student have then been able to identify way in which they would deal with each emotion, describing what they do currently and what other strategies they could be using. Green Class have also completed some science experiments in which they record their hypothesis, method and results. One popular experiment has been the Skittle rainbow.






Red Class


In literacy this term we have studied the book Fox for our accelerated literacy module and staff were delighted to see Terrell take the lead and read the book





each day for the class. Students have also improved their reading outcomes across the board and as a result have become better communicators through targetted literacy rotations encompassing a focus on spelling and sentence construction.

For our focus in numeracy students have worked really well going through our whole school targetted numeracy rotations and the guys have made some really impressive gains, with all students recording improvemnets in our numeracy post testing. We wish all the Red class gang a happy holidays and great things for their futures.



Yellow Class

This term in Accelerated Literacy, yellow class has been investigating Australia and its many different environments.

We have been looking at Australian oceans and deserts. We have been researching the features of each environment, how they function, the animals and the Indigenous perspective. The students loved reading the different texts and watching save the reef and outback Australian videos, we have learnt how adaptations help our unique animals to survive. We have also had health week and beach safety week in term 4. Students have enjoyed learning how to brush their teeth correctly and also how a rip is formed and how to avoid them.


In mathematics students have been studying a range topics. Practising our multiplication during our Maths card games. We have also been focusing on length and area, students have enjoyed find areas of different objects in the school.





We have also been looking at positioning and how to read a map and students have used compass point to pot point and make their own maps. In Science we have looked at the effects of cola on our teeth by soaking an egg and observing the effects. Also in Science we perfected our slime techniques and also started our own little vegetable garden.

We have continued to enjoy our K-Street programme in class each Thursday. This programme focuses on giving students the tools to understand why they feel the way they feel and then gives them some tools to help deal appropriately with their emotions. Students have been working on their own individual ready to learn plans and mapped their own daily Escalation map that they can reference to see at what times of the day they can practice their mindfulness exercises we learn in our K-Street programme.

We have also begun to try and initiate a new Yidaki program for our young indigenous students which while still in its fledgling stages has been very well received by the boys. In Week 7 of Term 4 all classes at Kotara School participated in Health Week. Students studied four general topics of health; oral health, personal hygiene, cyber safety and personal safety linking to the PDHPE Syllabus. Classes explored these topics through class discussion, educational videos and worksheets.

The first topic was Oral Health. The students looked at the importance of brushing your teeth effectively and participated in an egg and coke experiment to see the damages of soft drink on your teeth.

The next topic was Personal Hygiene. Students discussed why it is important to wash your hands, shower, put on deodorant, change to clean clothes, eat healthy and exercise.

The third topic was Cybersafety. Students watched a clip from the Department of Education about the effects of Cyberbullying. Students also discussed as a class, ways to avoid being unsafe on social media.



The final topic was Personal Safety. Students discussed what to do in an emergency situation and what they would do in many different scenarios including if someone enters their personal space.


All classes enjoyed participating in Health Week as many important discussions were had about students everyday lives.

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
